Mark Carper shot and killed Dominick Frangiamore, and subsequently took his own life after a long stand off. If you pull the call history from the date of the shooting and the 30 days prior, you'll see on one day there was a disturbance (signal 22) and either a noise complaint (signal 88) or a weapons complaint (signal 36b) from the area. Likely from Carper's address 1543 East Voorhis Ave or Frangiamore's address of 10 Oak cir. On the previous day in question, the weapons complaint came out in the area first, supposedly a gun shot or a few. Deputies were familiar with Carper and knew it was likely him, but were unable to locate him or the source of the gun shot(s) at the time. Later that day, I believe between 1pm and 4pm, the disturbance or verbal altercation took place between Carper and Frangiamore. Deputies Lemay and Johnson responded to the area but arrived after the altercation had concluded. The two Deputies attempted to contact Carper at his residence to conduct a well being check given Carper's past, the weapons complaint earlier in the day and the known possession of firearms by Carper. When the deputies went to Carper's residence, he refused to come out, held a gun to his own head and back deeper into the residence. A stand off ensued with the obviously armed, obviously suicidal Carper. After setting up a perimeter and giving verbal announcements for several hours, command staff decided there would be no action taken to secure Carper's safety or the safety of the surrounding homes/neighbors. The order was issued to break down the perimeter and return to service. An order which allowed an armed, violent, suicidal subject to remain at large. Subsequently, within the next 2 or 3 weeks, Carper returned to Frangiamore's residence, shooting and killing Frangiamore. All of which should/could/would have been avoided had command staff taken appropriate action during the first incident.
